COVER: Tuna fishing off the coast of Libya, where tuna are trapped in set nets. The net extends three miles to sea from the shore. Fishermen use barges, first to put out a wire skeleton, which is held in position by anchors, and then to fix the net over the wire. This operation may take from 2 to 3 weeks and employs about 60 fishermen. Catches per haul of net may vary from 12 to 500 tuna. Season is short, not more than a few months in the year
