COVER: One of 80,000 fresh-water ponds used for fish farming in the Republic of Malagasy. Fish farming is mainly a family business in Malagasy. The simple fish farms add valuable protein to the Malagasy diet. The Government of Malagasy is encouraging fish farming and has also stocked lakes and rivers with species of fish that mulitply rapidly. A fisheries expert of the Food and Agricultural Organization has suggested that fish from the farms could be preserved by smoking and drying and then transported to dry areas of Malagasy where protein foods are lacking.
